Ancient Greece was the birthplace of democracy. The first examples were in Athens. This began around 500 BCE. Nowadays, people have to put themselves forward to run for parliament. In Ancient Greece, all adult citizens had to take part.

In most modern countries, men and women can vote once they are adults. In Ancient Greece, only adult men could vote, and not if they were slaves. Each year, 500 of these free men were chosen at random to take part in the parliament. They had to serve for one year and were responsible for making new laws, amongst other things.
