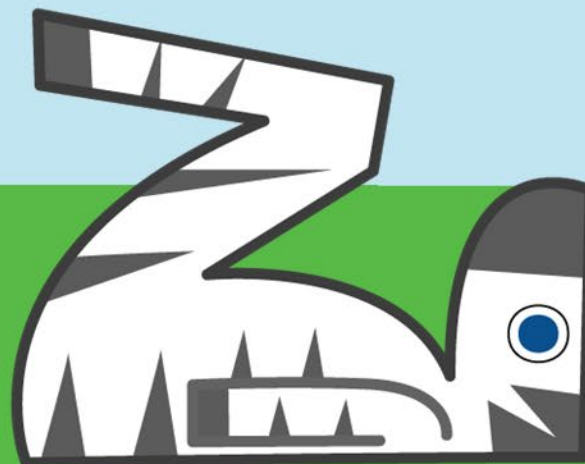

These stories can be used to support Phonics Shed lessons and as short stories to share throughout the day.

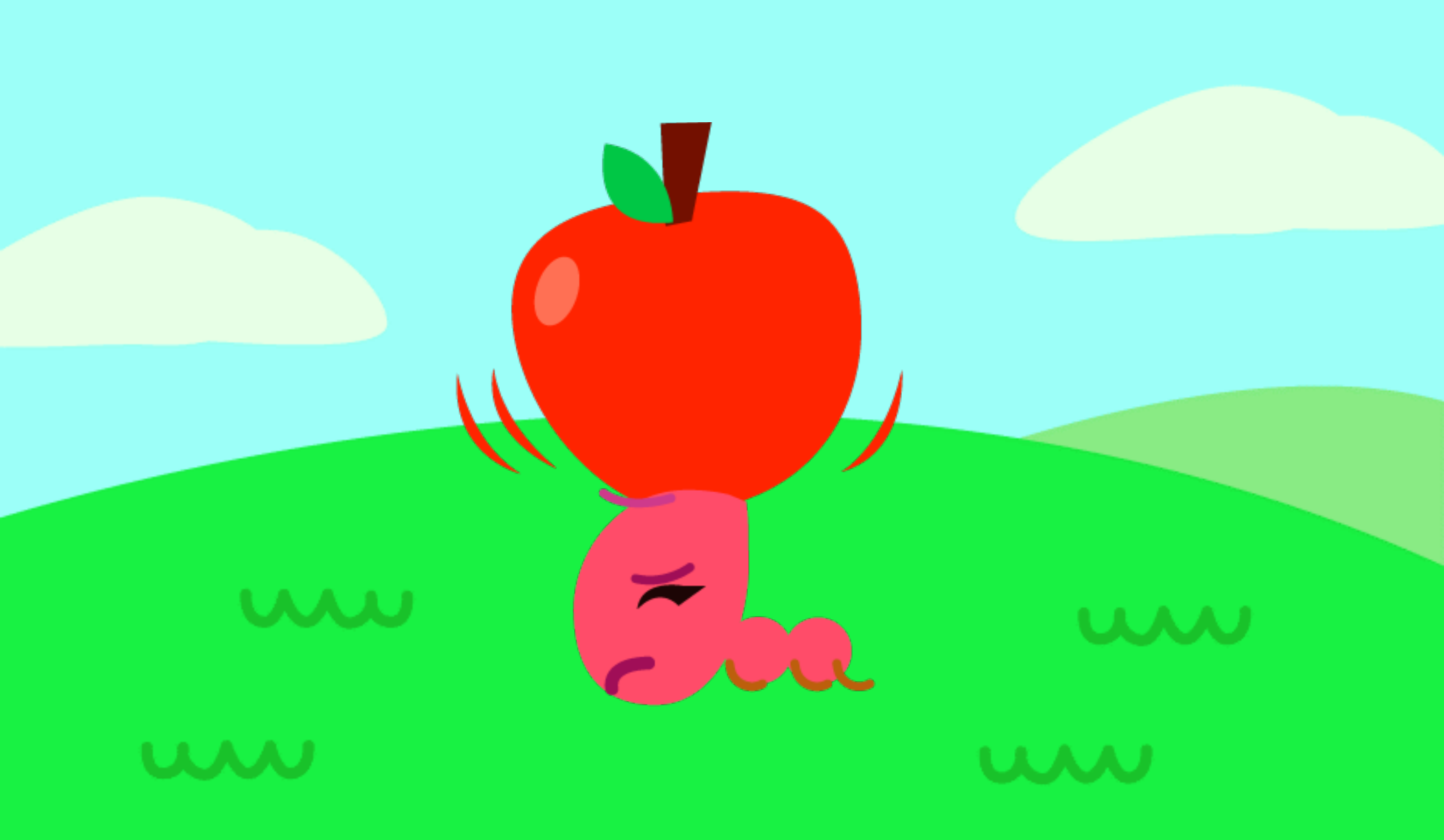

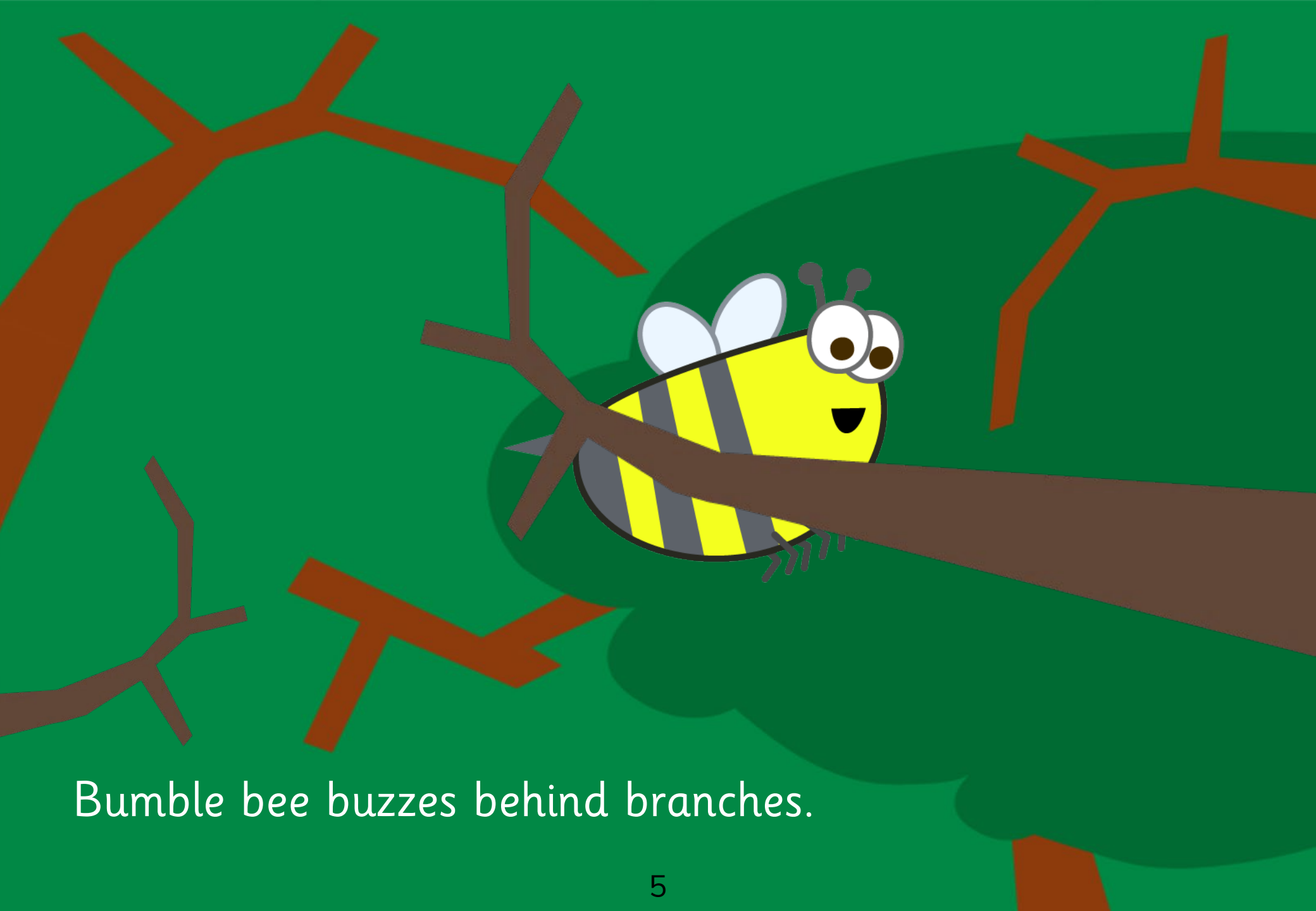

This story contains a fully alliterated sentence for each of the Chapter 2 characters. It can be used as full story, or each page can be used as part of the introduction of each character within lessons.



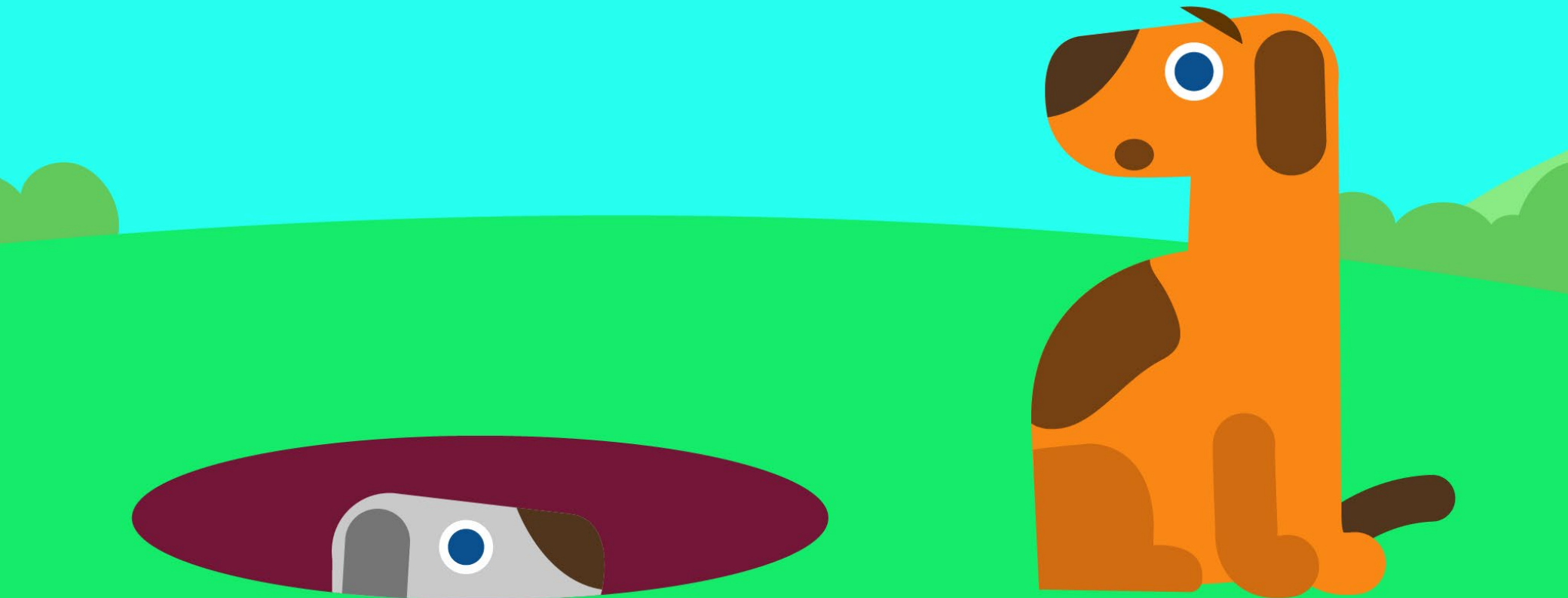
Anna ant, an apple and an accident.

Curly cat carries cakes carefully.





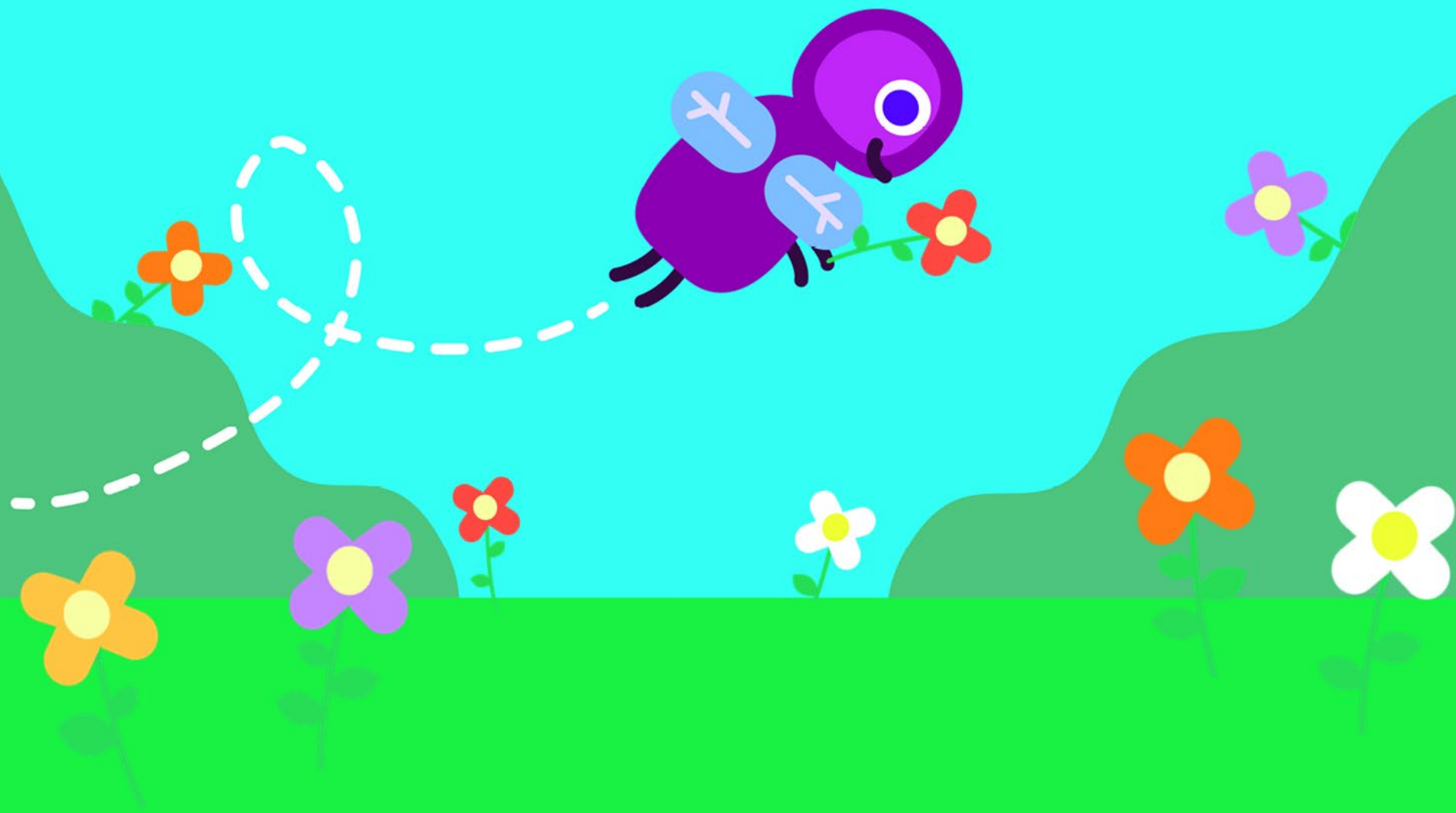
Dusty dog's dad digs down deep.

eggs everywhere.

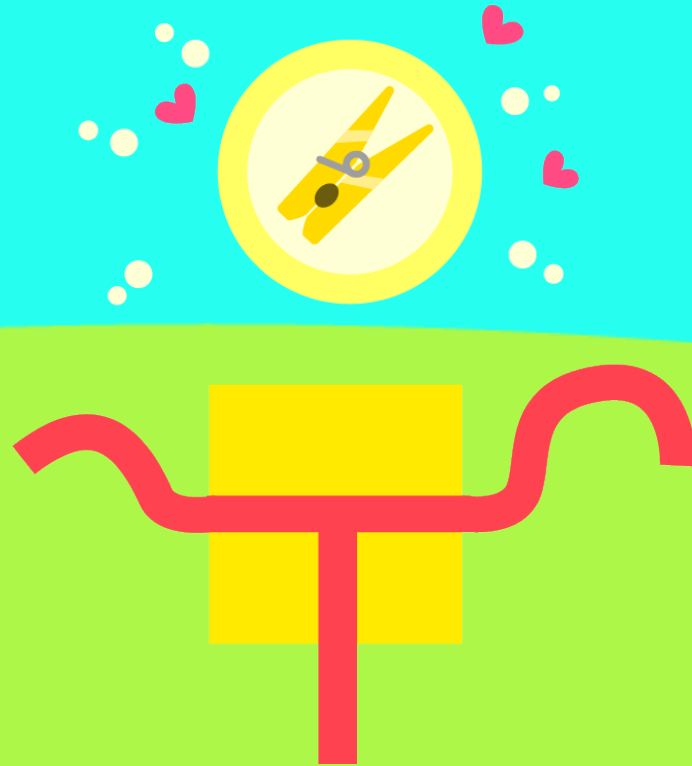




Flick fly floats freely finding flowers.



Grey goat gets glittery golden gifts.





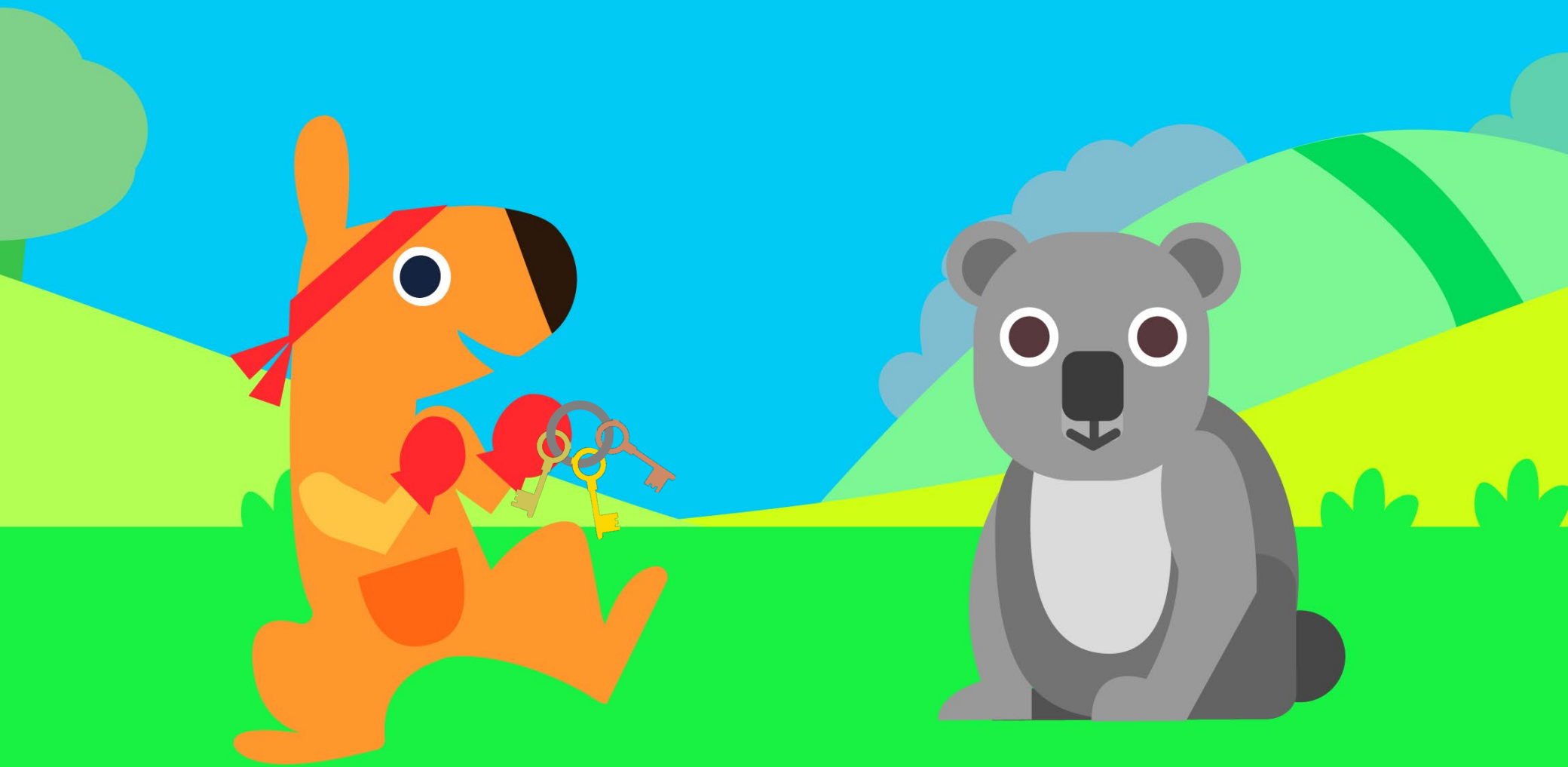
Haz hen hums happily.

Rex rat races running rabbits.

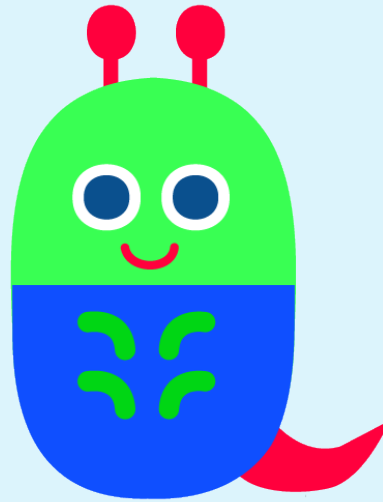
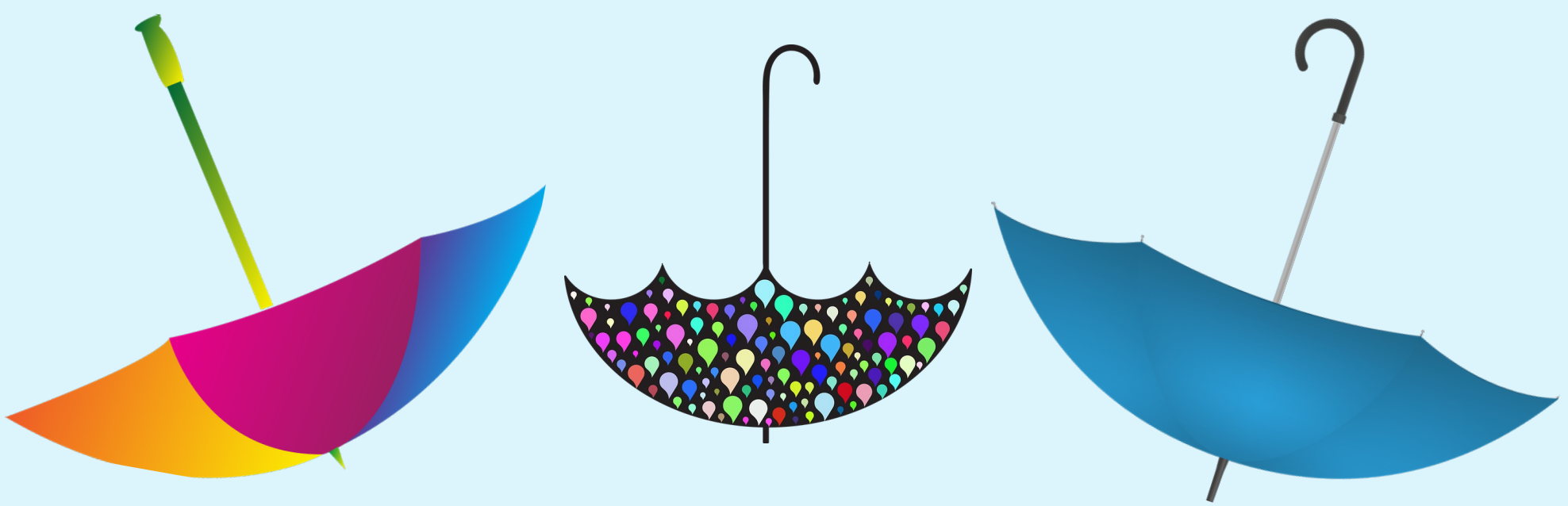

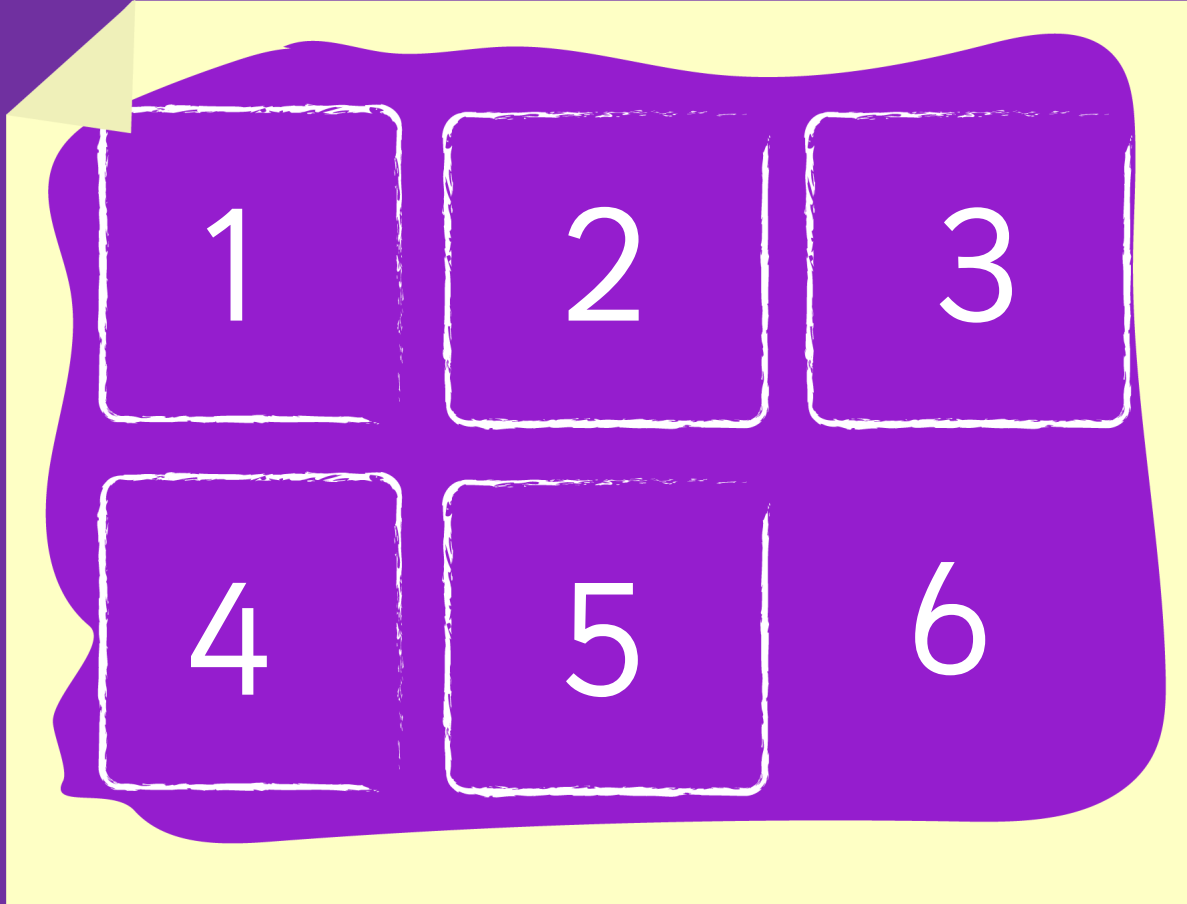

Can you flex your brain and find where the same sound is in each word?

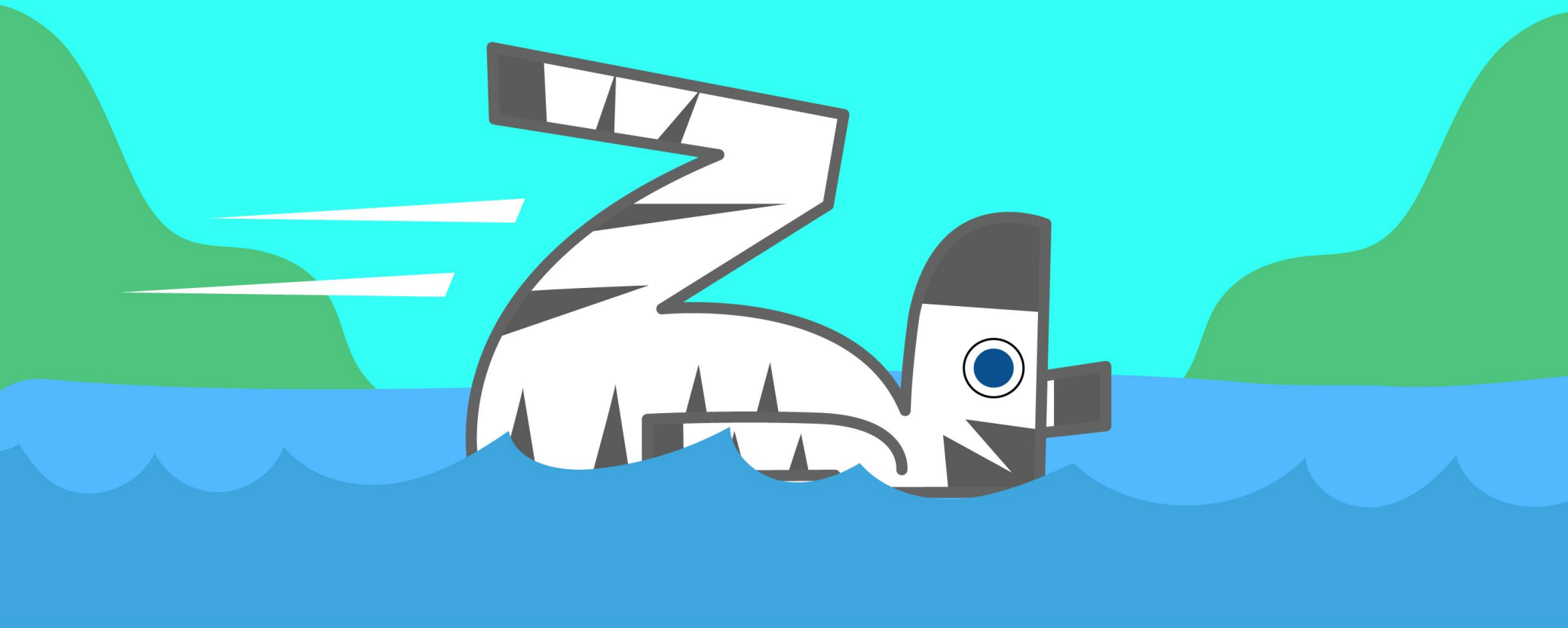
