- The session is designed to run for approximately 30 minutes in total.

Animals

Assessment Focus



To identify animals from the noises they make



To use voice sounds to demonstrate noises made by animals

Resources

- Resources 1 3
- <u>'Five Currant Buns' video from Piccolo Music</u>

Recap -

Five Currant Buns



Listen to the song from Piccolo Music and encourage the children to sing along to 'Five Currant Buns'. Alternatively, you can use the lyric sheet on **Resource 1**.

Introduction



Animal Sounds:

Show **Resource 2** and ask the children to use their voices to make a sound to match each animal. This links to the session on 'Old MacDonald Had a Farm' and you may want to make reference to this if you completed this lesson.





Recall: Ask the children how the person at the bakers shop knows which animal is coming.

Discuss: What other clues could the animals give? Discuss the noise the movements of the animals might make.



Activity

ØF

Who Am I?: Work in pairs or small groups. Split the pictures from **Resources 2 and 3** between the group. Each child looks at one card without showing it to anyone else and give each other clues to animals using sounds.

Simplify – use voice sounds backed up by actions and attempt to guess some others with multiple clues Expect – use voice sounds for animal 'voice' noises and guess some others Extend – use voice sounds for animal 'voice' noises and movements and guess some others

Plenary

Teacher thinks of an animal and children ask questions to try and guess the animal limit to 5 or 10. As a final clue make the animal 'voice' sound and any movement sound.



Praise the children for what they have done well in the session and address any misconceptions. "This week we have been learning lots of things using nursery rhymes. What other nursery rhymes do you know?"

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Currant Buns Recipe (makes 24 buns)

Equipment

- 3 mixing bowls
- sieve
- whisk
- wooden spoon
- scales
- oven tray
- tea towel

Ingredients

- 900g plain flour
- 100g butter
- 2 eggs
- 2tsp salt
- 100g sugar
- 1 tbsp dried yeast
- 300ml warm milk
- 40ml warm water
- 250g currants

Decoration:

- 300g Icing sugar
- 40ml milk
- 24 cherries

Currant Buns Recipe



- 1. Mix together the yeast, milk and water in a large bowl.
- 2. Add 200g flour and 1tbsp sugar, mix well and leave for 30 mins.
- 3. Mix the remaining dry ingredients into another bowl.
- 4. Add the dry ingredients mix, butter and eggs to the yeast mixture and mix to a dough.
- 5. Knead until dough is smooth (approximately 5 minutes).
- 6. Cover with a damp tea towel and leave to rise until double in size.
- 7. Divide into 24 equal sized pieces. Shape into a rounded cuboid shape
- 8. Put these onto a greased baking tray, leaving lots of room between them.
- 9. Cover them with the damp tea towel again and leave them for 30 minutes.
- 10. Ask an adult to put them in a preheated over (220°C or gas mark 7) for 10 to 15 minutes (or until golden brown).
 - 11. Leave them to cool for at least 15 minutes
 - 12. Add the milk a little at a time to the icing sugar and mix until it is smooth. You may not need all the milk.
 - 13. Drizzle the icing on top of the buns.
 - 14. Put a cherry on top of each bun.
