Why 'Christmas'?

The word 'Christmas' originates from the old English phrase Cristes maesse, which means 'Christ's mass'. This was shortened to 'Xmas' as the Greek word for Christ is **Χριστός**.

Did you know Christmas wasn't always on 25th December?

Christmas is a Christian festival which celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ; however, the date of December 25th isn't mentioned anywhere in the Bible. Some historians believe Jesus was born in spring not winter! The Roman Catholic Church chose to mark Jesus' birthday on the 25th December, with this date becoming an annual feature of the Christian calendar from 336 AD.

Do you know why people give gifts at Christmas?

Christians give gifts at Christmas as an acknowledgement of the presents the Wise Men gave to the baby Jesus. Winter gift-giving also has its roots in a pagan celebration called Saturnalia, where offerings were given to the gods.

Christmas Tree oh Christmas Tree!

Why do people put up and decorate a Christmas tree? Evergreen trees have been used to decorate homes since the Ancient Egyptian times, where green palms were used to mark the winter solstice. The tradition of decorating a Christmas tree came from Germany but rose in popularity when Queen Victoria and her German husband, Prince Albert-the prince consort, were sketched standing in front of their tree sharing gifts with their children. This image made Christmas trees fashionable and in high demand.

Jolly St. Nick!

Father Christmas, or Santa Claus, was a Christian bishop called Saint Nicholas. Whilst he didn't always wear a red suit, an image which became popular in the 1930s in Coca-Cola adverts, he did give all his inheritance to the poor and needy. His name was Sinter Klass, which later became known as Santa Claus. Early pictures of Father Christmas weren't too child-friendly, showing him with quite a serious face-very different to the image now know and love of plump, smiling Santa.

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The amount of wrapping paper used in the UK at Christmas could cover the whole island of Guernsey.

Christmas Food!

Turkey hasn't always been the food of choice on Christmas Day, traditionally it used to be a pig's head served with mustard.

On Christmas Day in Japan, fried chicken is eaten making it the busiest time of year for KFC.

The earliest Christmas decorations were apples to remind people of the story of Adam and Eve.
