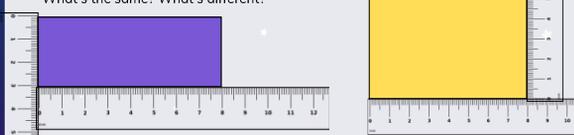

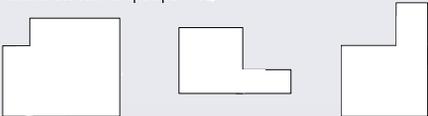
Activity 1:

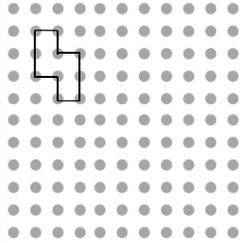
Activity 2:

If the dots are spaced exactly 1 cm from each other, what is the total perimeter of the shape shown?

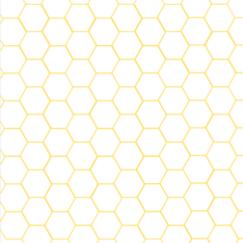


If we doubled the length of each side, what would the shape look like?

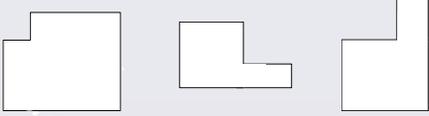
Activity 4:
